


Preface

Each year, Aurora Academic Charter School, along with other school divisions in the province, is obligated to submit a Three-Year Capital Plan to Alberta Education.

A summary of a Capital Plan includes:

- A catalog of capital priorities that the School Board wishes to be funded by the Provincial Government. These plans are a facility needs list submitted to the Government for consideration in its infrastructure planning process. Ultimately, it is the Government that determines which projects will receive funding and when they will commence.
- School authorities do not receive annual funding for the purpose of constructing new schools or undertaking major renovations to existing ones.
 If projects fail to obtain approval from the Provincial Government, the School Division is unable to proceed with the construction.
- Although referred to as a Three-Year Capital Plan, it should be noted that not all, or any, of the projects are guaranteed to be approved or completed within the specified timeframe. Even if a project ranks at the top of a Capital Plan, it may take several years for it to receive approval.
- Capital plans include tentative start dates, end dates, and costs; however, these are estimates and suggestions. The dates are determined based on the authority's desired pace for the project and the potential for immediate construction if approved. Additionally, the dates often reflect any preliminary work already undertaken to advance the project, such as negotiating a location with a municipality. The suggested dates and costs aid the Provincial Government in evaluating the project and deciding whether or not to approve it. If a project is approved, the Government will determine the actual timelines and budget.
- An authority is obligated to prioritize all projects, but this does not guarantee that they will proceed in that order. For example a modernization project involving the renovation of an existing facility may be undertaken before the construction of a new school. Various factors, including cost, can influence this decision. Furthermore, priorities may shift, particularly if unforeseen circumstances arise that alter the urgency of a particular project.
